

Our organisational structure



Studio + School culture

- At UQ we encourage a vibrant studio culture, where students work iteratively and collaboratively to learn from interaction with peers and teaching staff in both contact and non-contact hours.
- Learn the necessary rhythms and processes of design, through a repetitive cycle of thinking, doing and reflecting.
- Students are actively guided and trained on how to work in design studios, gaining essential skills that will carry forward through their studies and into their professional career.
- The opportunity to work in hand-drawn and digital media for work-in-progress and final drawings, plus multiple physical models.



Fieldwork

- Fieldwork occurs in various modes, the most common being site visits in the Greater Brisbane area and South East Queensland.
- Site visits are fundamental in providing architecture and planning students with perspective and context – site conditions, topography, ground conditions, orientation.
 Site visits can be to specific area that is the basis of that cohort's design brief, to experience exemplar buildings; to gain knowledge of construction sites and industry or commercial operations.
- Fieldwork can also involve domestic or international travel.



Graduate Exhibition

- Our annual End of Year Exhibition is the most important event in the School's calendar, bringing together students, practitioners and academic staff.
- A student Exhibition Curatorial team is responsible for the design and execution of the Exhibition.
- Features work of students graduating from architecture, design, planning and urbanism programs.


Complete **32 units** from the MArch Course List comprising:

- Avoid taking two 4-unit Design courses in the same semester.








Design Courses offered for Semester 1 2025




